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Confirmation: A Brief History of Development

There is nothing more Lutheran today than the practice of confirmation. As it is currently practiced, confirmation is a rite (ceremony) within which a person makes a confession of faith, solemn promises before God, and receives a blessing from the pastor. It marks the completion of a more in-depth study of Luther's Small Catechism. But where does it come from? We know that it cannot be found in Scripture. It has no command or institution by Christ. In this article I hope to give you a very brief overview of its history.

Within the first three centuries of the Christian Church, immediately following the baptism, a person was anointed with oil. In the Roman world, anointing with olive oil always followed a bath! But, theologically, Jesus is described as being anointed with the Spirit in baptism (Luke 4:18; Acts 10:38) and Christians are anointed and sealed with the Spirit (1 Corinthians 1:21-22). Aaron and his sons were anointed into the priesthood (Exodus 29:7) and Christians are called a royal priesthood (Revelation 1:6). It seems inevitable that anointing would be a part of the baptism ceremony. The pastor anointed the person, made the sign of the cross on him, and then laid his hands on the person and blessed him. These were all done together with the baptism.

After the fourth century AD, more and more emphases were given to the anointing and laying on of hands of the baptized. By *chrismation* (the anointing of oil) baptismal candidates were *christened* and called Christians. There seems to be, at this time, an indication that even the Holy Spirit or a particular blessing of the Spirit was conveyed through the laying on of hands in the conclusion of the baptism. Faustus, the bishop of Riez, at the end of the fifth century wrote that a person is "reborn in baptism for life," but is "confirmed after baptism for the strife. In baptism we are washed; after baptism we are strengthened...*Confirmation* arms and supplies those needing to be preserved for the struggles and battles of this world." While this might not have been the prevailing opinion at the time, nor was there a church doctrine regarding confirmation, this seems to present an early attempt to distinguish confirmation from baptism.

By the Middle Ages, confirmation emerges as an independent rite from baptism. Bishops were required for baptisms, but as the Church expanded rapidly and vastly, the number of bishops available for baptisms were few and far between. To adapt to this problem, the Eastern Church allowed the local priests to baptize and anoint the person, rather than wait for the bishop to arrive. The Western Church, however, chose to have the priests baptize, but the bishop would later (sometimes years later) give the anointing and laying on of hands (the confirmation).

By the time of the Reformation, confirmation was an entirely separate rite from baptism. It was a sacrament of the church which conveyed the Holy Spirit and gave God's grace. Martin Luther opposed this, arguing that confirmation was not instituted nor commanded by Christ, nor did it contain any promise of grace from the Scriptures, and therefore could not be considered a sacrament. Lutherans, therefore, removed confirmation as a sacrament. Some guit practicing it altogether. Martin Luther said that while it was unnecessary, it could be kept in good faith. Just as other things like water for baptism, Bibles, or churches can be sanctified by the Word of God and prayer,

so can people. But we must remember that it is not required by God or given by Him.

However, the learning of the Catechism was always required by Lutherans. This follows the commandment of our Lord: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them..., *teaching* them to observe all that I have commanded you." And the Apostle Paul writes, "Fathers...bring up [your children] in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." (Ephesians 6:4) Thus, more important than confirmation itself, is what leads up to confirmation.

Next month I hope to write a little more about confirmation during the Reformation and about what should be required before receiving communion.


