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The Crucifix

The church season of Lent is quickly coming upon us, February 14th to be precise. Yes, Valentine's Day is also Ash Wednesday this year. I bet that would make a good sermon...come and find out!

This would be a good time to talk about the cross, particularly the crucifix. The cross, plain or with the body of Jesus on it (a crucifix), is a powerful symbol of the redemption which Jesus won for us on Good Friday. The ancient world knew what crucifixions looked like. Romans frequently crucified rebels and violent criminals as a terrifying warning. You would find crosses outside most major cities in the Roman world. It, therefore, became a scandal when Christians boasted in their crucified Lord. That would be like preachers proclaiming the Lord having been hanged or killed by electric chair or lethal injection. Imagine hanging a symbol like that in your churches or around your neck!

But, the Apostle Paul wrote: "For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are being called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God" (1 Cor. 1:22-24).

Paul also wrote, "For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and Him crucified" (1 Cor. 2:2).

And again, "Far be it from me to boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world" (Gal. 6:14).

The cross, therefore, is the Church's most important symbol, representing the central message of the Gospel, the means by

which Christ won our salvation. Either a cross with or without the body of Jesus serves as this symbol. One common misconception is that the empty cross reminds us that Jesus is risen. The fact is, the cross would be empty whether or not Jesus had remained in the grave! There are symbols for resurrection: an empty tomb, flowers, candles, butterflies, and even bunnies and chicks. The cross, however, is always a symbol of the crucifixion.

Another misconception about the crucifix is that it is a Roman Catholic thing. If you have visited historic Lutheran churches in America or Lutheran churches in Europe, you will know that this is not true. They all have crucifixes (unless they later removed them). In fact, the founding churches of the LCMS had (and many still have) crucifixes. However, after being influenced by American Protestants, who come from the tradition of not having them, Lutherans in America stopped using them for a while.

Why didn't American Protestants have crucifixes? Because they mostly came from the tradition of Ulrich Zwingli, a 16th century Reformed theologian, who viewed depictions of God and Jesus and other saints in art and statues and on crosses as being idolatry. Lutherans never thought this way, but appreciated any art which would contribute to the teaching and devotion of the church's worship.

What advantages might there be in having a crucifix? It serves as a vivid reminder of the one who died for us. Remember, it was not the wood of the cross that saved you, but the One who hung there with your sins. It also returns a bit more of the scandal of the cross.

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The Crucifix

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Even rappers and celebrities wear crosses for fashion. But a crucifix will show what the symbol is all about. The cross is not cleaned up for you. It shows the gravity of your sins and the weight of God's love for you. Whether an empty cross or crucifix, may this symbol fix your eyes on Jesus now and always.

Caring for My Neighbor

If any of the Ten Commandments might tempt us to think that keeping the Law is easy, it would be the Fifth Commandment. After all, how hard is it to get through life without murdering somebody? The vast majority of people can handle that!

But Jesus famously blows up this notion by pointing out that the command, "you shall not murder," goes much deeper — down to the heart.

You have heard that it was said to those of old, "You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment." But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, "You fool!" will be liable to the hell of fire. (Matt. 5:21–22)

Hatred and disdain come from the same sort of crookedness of heart as murder. With both murder and hatred, you look down on another person and think them of little worth.

In the Small Catechism, Luther also points out that every "do not" in the commandments also includes a "do this:" "We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body but help and support him in every physical need" (SC, Fifth Commandment, emphasis added).

We are not called merely to avoid evil; we must also do positive good.

So when Jesus drew near to us and became our neighbor by taking up our humanity, He came not only to avoid harming us, but He came to positively help us, bless us, and serve us.

We are now called to show the love to our neighbors that Christ showed to us. Your neighbor is yet another gift that God has given you that requires your stewardship. We are called to show mercy, to be kind, to love and serve our neighbor. One aspect of this stewardship is financial: our neighbors need us to support the church's work so that they can hear the Gospel and come to faith. Our neighbors need the church's alms and mercy work. Our neighbors need our faithful service in all we do in the name of Christ


We are planning some Lenten activities to help us walk through the weeks before Easter. Stay tuned!
